
## -ĪRE verbs



The part of the verb that ends in -īre is called the infinitive.


In English, the infinitive starts with the word "to", followed by the name of the verb.

-īre verbs are the fourth conjugation, or group, of Latin verbs.

The -īre group of verbs is the smallest group.

audīre	to hear			
aud <mark>iō</mark>	I hear			
aud <mark>īs</mark>	you hear (one person)			
aud <mark>it</mark>	he / she hears			
audīmus	we hear			
aud <mark>ītis</mark>	you hear (more than one person)			
audi <mark>unt</mark>	they hear			

To make the part of the verb that you need, chop off the -īre to make the stem, then add the right ending.
